EARLY DAYS IN NEW PORT RICHEY

From the files of Jullie Obenreder

In 1945 as you drove south on S.R. 595 (then old 19) at the edge of the city limits you could see a wide, deep, gaping hole in the ground. This had been the rock crushing plant owned by the L.F. Fernald Co.

In 1938 the company was busy filling contracts to supply finely crushed rock for the paving of several local roads. They employed a number of local men in their operation.

In the the same year they had a contract to furnish crushed limestone and travertine marble for the construction of a new Catholic Church being built in St. Petersburg. The marble was said to be as fine as any imported from Italy. Several hundred tons of crushed rock was shipped to the building of the new church.

In the 1960's the Tranter Construction Company filled that large hole and this was the beginning of the Jasmine Heights Subdivision.

Clifford Tranter and family moved here from the North in the late 1950's and began an extensive building program of low priced houses. Most were two bedroom homes complete with lot and sold for under \$5,000.00. The first subdivision built by Tranter Construction Co. was Jasmine Acres on the west side of Highway 119 north of the city. Jasmine Heights was the second development, Jasmine Lakes, the third, and Jasmine Hills was the last. And at the same time, this was the end of the low priced housing as retirees from the North flocked down to live here in the sunshine and buy a new home.

Is it too much to give the Museum 3 hours of your time every few months?


Please sign up so that we can remain open two afternoons a week.

GOING - GOING - GONE!

Bring a Friend to Bid Bring an Item to Sell During the months of March & April, Leonard and Mae Taylor of the Anclote Earth Science Club will display a million year old treasure. Florida's State Stone "Agatized Coral' will be featured. The late Wilma D. Bonar describes its history:

BURIED TREASURE

Agatized coral in many colors is found all over the state of Florida. Sometimes these heads are solid; sometimes, as around Tampa Bay, they are hollow and known as geodes. Agatized coral is properly called "Psuedomorph after coral"because one mineral has been replaced with another. Long, long ago these "rocks" were colonies of little animals belonging to the phylum coelenterata. One of the anthozoas; they grew as polyps. Coral is the name of

the limy skeleton with which they encase themselves. Diluvial action of some kind covered these colonies of animals. These waters contained other minerals. Over a long period of time the carbonate of lime skeleton was replaced by the mineral quartz. This form of quartz is called chalcedony. (cal-ced'-o'ny). The geodes found in the Tampa area may have centers of carnelian, agate, and quartz crystals. In the northern part of Florida heads of various shades of yellow, banded with blue have been found. Solid carnelian heads have been found. The geodes are found in many colors, sizes and formations. They are highly prized as specimens and are used to make beautiful jewelry. They have come to be called "Ballast Point Diamonds" because they were first found in quantity at Ballast Point.

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




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
