A FOG FIGURE OR DEATH by G.L. Brandli

My family and the Altarr family who lived down the Mountainside near the village of Lost Creek, West Virginia, had to secure water from a spring about a tenth of a mile around the side of the hill. The water jetted from a crevice in the rock face of a small cliff and flowed into a rocky pool at the base.

It was an early Fall evening and as usual, Mr. Altarr and his two sons, Leslie about age eleven and Carl age seven, were going to the spring to bring in water for the night. The sun was still shining low on the horizon and the three of them were enjoying the warmth of the day and the crunch of fallen leaves beneath their feet. When they had gone about half way, when Carl looked up to his right and said, "Oh, there's my friend, I have to go play with him. " The Father looked up also and there in a clearing about 75 yards higher on the mountain was a wisp of what looked like fog, about 2 feet in diameter and about 4 feet tall. It was moving around in the clearing and at times touched the ground and then rose slightly as if flying. Carl started to run toward the dancing fog, but his Father called out to stop and Carl came back. When he did, the fog was gone. Mr. Altarr stood there shaking. Why was he so afraid? He could not explain it, but a prickly sensation ran up his neck as he thought of what he had just seen. They continued their journey and secured the water, but he rushed the boys past that spot on the way back home.

The next day was uneventful and as usual and at about the same time, the Father and the two boys headed out for the spring and water. As they approached the spot where the bank of fog had been seen the evening before, Carl again said, "Oh, look, there is my friend again, I have to go play with him." With that, Carl started running up the Mountainside. Mr. Altarr saw the fog dancing, just as before and he began to scream at his son to come back. Carl continued his sprint toward the clearing and the Father then began to run after him, screaming for him to come back. His fear of the unknown permeated his heart. Running as hard as he could, the Father was about 20 yards behind his son, when the boy reached the dancing fog bank. Carl called out, "I'm here," and threw his arms around the fog which was the same size as he was.

The son spun around twice with his arms around the fog and then fell to the ground. By the time Mr.

Altarr reached him, his son was on his back, a smile on his face, but he was dead. The fog had gone.

It was the subject of discussion for months, but none of the experts called in could explain the event that took the life of one so young.

At one time, I was inclined to scoff in disbelief at the stories told around the coal fire by my older relatives and neighbors. They spoke of Hoop Snakes grasping their tails in their mouth and rolling down the Mountainside. Of Balls of Fire rolling through the night and my uncle worth swore he had seen this. When a Ball of Fire would hit a mountain cabin, someone inside would die at that instant. Then Carl died and my life perspective changed. Let us all listen intently to what others are saying and not be judges of what they believe.

My brother's neighbor near Broad Run, West Virginia, a spinster lady by the name of Guerney Funk who keeps a Holstein cow on a rope and takes her for evening strolls along the river has a solution for all her problems. When problems do occur in her life, she just places her broom on the floor across the threshold. She believes that problems and bad spirits cannot cross a broom handle and so she remains safe in her home. Who know? My brother says it seems to work for her.
